Farewell Dean Gajria



River

I participated in River Day, an event held on October 10, 2024, where 5th grade classes from the Nyack School District tested the Hudson River. Thousands of students have the opportunity to catch and release various fish species, track the river's tides and currents, check salinity levels, examine water chemistry and quality in this annual event, known as "Day in the Life of the Hudson and Harbor." This hands-on learning experience is coordinated by the Hudson River Estuary Program of the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation, in partnership with the Hudson River National Research Reserve and the Lamont-Doherty Earth Observatory.

During the first part of the day, I collaborated with two different schools. I had one fifth grade class from 9 am to 11 am and another class from 12 pm to 3 pm from each school. During River Day, I worked with students to test the water current, low tide or high tide, water temperature, air temperature, and clarity of the water. I found many children fascinated with the idea of brackish water. Brackish water is a mixture of freshwater and saltwater. When the freshwater from the Appalachian Mountains mixes with the saltwater of the ocean, the water in the estuary of the Hudson River is brackish.

During this group work time, I witnessed a variety of different learning approaches: experimental, collaborative, and direct which enabled students to learn in different ways. Participating in River Day was an incredible experience that provided a deep understanding of the Hudson River's ecosystem. It highlighted the complexities of the River's behavior and sparked curiosity among the students. This event not only enhanced our understanding but also fostered a greater appreciation for the Hudson River and its environment.

Commitment to Life Long Learning



On November 19th, 25 elementary and secondary teacher candidates participated in a professional development workshop on teaching environmental and global studies. The workshop was facilitated by Population Education. The non-profit organization provides educators with innovative, hands-on lesson plans and classroom strategies focused on human population growth and its impact on the environment and human well-being.

In a workshop on "The Art of Writing," author Jen Doktorski, Dr. Collucci's sister, shared her own experience in creative writing with 35 School of Education students. The workshop helped students see themselves as writers as well as teachers of writing. The hour and half workshop included a look at the author's own drafting and brainstorming materials as well as an opportunity to practice some pre-writing and revising strategies that the preservice teachers can use with their future students.





In October, Ashlee Butler, the Family Community and Engagement Supervisor at Haverstraw Head Start, came to talk to students from the School of Education about the work she and the other staff at Head Start do for young children and their families. During the session, which Dr. Elizabeth Finnegan moderated, Ashlee described how she became a social worker and decided to stay with Head Start because she likes interacting with the families and staff. Ashlee spoke on a more challenging aspect of her job. As part of her duties, she has to determine whether families are eligible for the Head Start program based on their income, and even when families earn just a few dollars over the federal eligibility guidelines, she has to turn them away. Ashlee told the students her job is extremely rewarding because she sees families who might have faced food insecurity or homelessness flourish and start to support each other.

FACULTY UPDATES

Dr. Lo and Michael Malin presented a poster titled "ChatGPT's Disruption of Culturally Responsive Literacy Instruction: How the Predictive Nature of an LLM Contributes to Stereotyping in Student Research" at the National Council of Teachers of English Annual Convention in Boston, MA on November 23, 2024. Michael, an English teacher at North Rockland School District, is an alum of BS Educational Studies and MST program.

Last semester, Dr. Nydia Prishker led a series of professional development workshops for home-based childcare providers at Grail Family Services in San Jose, California. She focused on teaching early mathematical concepts and she provided practical tips on how to effectively promote mathematical learning in young children.

Dr. Finnegan co-authored an article titled "How teachers provide writing instruction to autistic students" published in *Research in Autism Spectrum Disorders*. She will present at the Council for Exceptional Children Annual Convention in Baltimore this March on designing writing instruction for students with autism.

Dr.Collucci presented at the Association for Literacy Educators and Researchers on November 8th, 2023 in Orlando, Florida. Her presentation was titled, Going for Gold in Literacy: Teaching Foundational Skills within and an Engaging Learning Environment

Dr. Ciotoli's paper titled "Using Instructional Rounds to Build a Community of Inclusive Practitioners – Year 3," was accepted for the 2025 AERA Annual Meeting in Denver, Colorado. She continues to work with All In for Inclusive Education.

A month prior to successfully defending her doctoral dissertation in June 2024, Dr. Rosati presented at the Northeast PBIS Network Leadership Forum, Mystic, CT. She co-presented on "PBIS Skills Beyond High School: A Special Education Youth Perspective on Transition," and "College & Career Readiness: Who Are We Failing, and How Can We Improve? ".
