COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

Regular Program

(All “regular” classes are on Tuesday mornings)

Sept. 8, 10:00-11:15 am (by **Zoom**)

The Art and Architecture of Ancient Rome – Suzanne Altman #1

This class will look at the progression of Roman art from the Etruscans to the Republican Era to the Imperial Age. We will look at the important innovations of the Romans in architecture and technology that transformed many civilizations that followed.

Sept. 8, 11:30 am-12:45 pm (by **Zoom**)

Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart – Martin Schneit #1

Mozart was the quintessential child prodigy who astonished the world. This celebrated Austrian composer produced over 800 works in his short life. Listen to excerpts from the following great compositions: *Turkish March*, *Bastien and Bastienne*, *La Finta Semplice*, *Eine Kleine Nachtmusik*, *Don Giovanni*, *The Magic Flute*, *Queen of the Night*, *The Marriage of Figaro* and *The Requiem*.

Sept. 15, 10:00-11:15 am (by **Zoom** and **Onsite**)

The History of Robotics – Dr. Alan Pierce

This class will look at Robotics from the earliest days when machines started to perform the work once done by people to today’s humanoid AI-driven systems.

Jewish New York – Martin Schneit #2

Marty will detail how Jewish America started in New York City. He will talk about the Brownsville Girls, Shearith Israel, Temple Emanuel, the Jews of Brighton Beach, the Eldridge Street Synagogue, Rebbe Menachem Mendel Schneerson, Gustav Mahler, Washington Heights (aka Frankfurt on the Hudson), Zabar’s, the egg cream, and Henny Youngman. Marty will explain how the New York Jews pioneered the rise of the garment industry which had a great impact on the world of fashion.

The Art of the Dutch Golden Age – Suzanne Altman #2

The 17th century was an incredibly productive time for art in The Netherlands with great painters like Rembrandt, Hals, and Vermeer. It featured a revolution in the style and subject matter of art. Landscapes, still lifes, portraits, and genre paintings were bought in great numbers as the Dutch Republic prospered.

Write It Out – Ronni Miller

Write It Out® is a hands-on expressive writing workshop with exercises from a nationally recognized program. You will experience motivational exercises that tap into your feelings, memories, and experiences and you write them out in any genre including memoir, fiction, and poetry. *The Write It Out Book*, by Ronni Miller, a new textbook with expressive writing syllabi, available on Amazon, will be used in the workshop, but is not required.

Leave Your Legacy, Not a Headache (Because “Figure It Out Later” Is Not an Estate Plan) – **Courtney Boniface Part 1 of 2**

Topics this session will include: Charitable Giving Strategies that Stretch Your Legacy (But Not Your Bank Account) and Protecting Beneficiaries through Trusts when divorce, creditors, and/or spending issues are a concern.

America by the Numbers – **Sylvia Lewis**

Who are we? In this class the question isn’t about philosophy. It’s about demographics. We’ll be exploring what the latest Census Bureau information tells us about ourselves as Americans – about our population, our families, and our communities. The data may surprise us and it may challenge some of our long-held assumptions about our nation. Sylvia Lewis is a retired journalist who has often mined census data when writing about cities and city planning.

Oct. 6, 10:00-11:15 am (**Onsite** and by **Zoom**)

Abraham Lincoln: The Great Emancipator – **Tom DeStefano #1**

Born in a one-room log cabin in Kentucky, this self-educated lawyer was elected the first Republican president in 1860. His victory prompted a majority of the slave states to secede and form the Confederate States which led to the Civil War. In 1863, Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation which declared slaves to be free. He delivered the Gettysburg Address which became one of the most famous speeches in American history. He is remembered as a national hero for his wartime leadership and his efforts to preserve the Union and abolish slavery.

Oct. 6, 11:30 am -12:45 pm (**Onsite** and by **Zoom**)

Buena Vista Social Club: the Musical – **Rick Feingold #1**

In the 1950s, Havana, a group of young musicians, created a sound that shook the world of Cuban music – until the revolution changed everything. Forty years later, the band came back together to record the songs they had left behind and unexpectedly created the greatest-selling world music album of all time. This class covers pre-revolutionary life in 1950s Cuba, the *Son Cubano* musical artists featured in a 1999 documentary movie, and the Tony-award winning 2025 *Buena Vista Social Club* Broadway musical.

Great Changes – **Dr. Marty O. Cohen, Part 1 of 2**

In this class we will discuss important innovations in technology and major scientific discoveries that changed the course of human history.

Oct. 13, 11:30 am -12:45 pm (**Onsite** and by **Zoom**)

The Opera Experience – Joan Mallory

This class continues Joan's delightful, interactive presentations including costumes, drama, music, and a mock visit by the composer and features exposure to beautiful operatic arias. This time the class will feature the opera *Turandot* by Giacomo Puccini, which is about Prince Calaf, in ancient Peking, who saves his life by answering three riddles that a cruel princess has given him. The story tells how the power of his love restores peace to the kingdom.

Oct. 20, 10:00-11:15 am (by **Zoom**)

Gentle Chair Yoga & Breathwork – Bette Willins

This chair-based yoga class is appropriate for all ages and levels of ability. Instruction incorporates yoga postures, gentle movement sequences, and breath awareness with applied breathwork practice, all of which focus on bringing an increased sense of mindful awareness. Research demonstrates that mindful breathing, as well as yoga bodywork practices, are effective in managing stress and benefit the nervous system. All are welcome. No yoga experience is necessary.

Beauty, Serenity, and Inspiration through Poetry and Nature – Phyllis Citrin

This course will use poetry sources such as Amanda Gorman's *Call Us What We Carry*, National Geographic's *Book of Nature Poetry*, and other sources selected for their power to inspire, soothe, and allow us to share the beauty within us and the beauty still remaining on this beautiful earth.

Great Changes – Dr. Marty O. Cohen, Part 2 of 2

In this class we will discuss major events that changed the course of American history. Be prepared for some surprises.

Religion and the First Amendment – Dr. Duncan Lee II, Part 1 of 3

Thomas Jefferson famously advocated for a complete separation of Church and State. However, those words do not appear anywhere in the U.S. Constitution. The First Amendment to the constitution contains five rights, one of them referring to the "establishment" of a religion and to the "free exercise" of religion. This course will examine how the Supreme Court has interpreted the meaning of these First Amendment rights in the past, how the "Trump" Supreme Court interpreted recent related cases, and where the Court seems to be headed in the future.

John F. Kennedy: The King of Camelot – Tom DeStefano #2

At 43, JFK was the youngest person elected President. A Harvard graduate, he commanded PT boats during World War II. As a senator, he won a Pulitzer Prize for his book *Profiles in Courage*. At the height of the cold war, he authorized an attempt to overthrow the Cuban government of Fidel Castro in the failed Bay of Pigs invasion. Kennedy stared down the Russians during the 1962 Cuban Missile Crisis. He presided over the establishment of the Peace Corps and the goal of landing a man on the moon.

1950s TV Quiz Show Scandals – Rick Feingold #2

In 1956, the TV game show *Twenty-One* premiered and was, at first, played honestly but ended as a “dismal failure” when “popular” contestants could not answer the questions correctly. As a result, *Twenty-One* became rigged with certain players being given answers in advance. When dominant long-running winner Herbert Stempel was ordered to lose, he answered a key question incorrectly. Afterwards, however, he blew the whistle on the scam. Congressional hearings followed. This presentation will feature viewing the infamous *Twenty-One* episode when Herbert Stempel faced Charles Van Doren.

She has lectured on art history at many venues in the Hudson Valley and New Jersey. Suzanne is also a painter whose works have been widely exhibited.

Dr. Marty O. Cohen has a doctorate in Nuclear Science and Engineering from Columbia University. He has lectured on history, science, and the historic approach to Bible at Road Scholar (nee Elderhostel) seminars, the Melton Institute, alumni associations, JCCs, synagogues, culture clubs, and well over sixty times here at the Collaborative. He is the longest serving member of TLC Board and is the catalog editor.

Ilana Davidson is a Grammy Award-winning soprano and performer based in Nyack. She trained at the Curtis Institute of Music and has performed in concert halls and opera houses throughout Europe and the United States. Ilana has been featured on many recordings. Tom DeStefano taught American History at Paterson H.S. for 30 years and currently teaches at Bergen Community College. He has presented many programs at local libraries. His specialties include the American presidents, the Civil War, and New Jersey history.

Dr. Duncan Rogers Lee II is a local attorney who has taught a variety of Constitutional Law and science classes at the Collaborative. So Who Was Thomas Aquinas?

Thomas Aquinas (c. 1225–1274) was a medieval Italian Dominican friar and one of the most influential philosophers and theologians in Western history. A Doctor of the Church, he labored to harmonize Christian faith with Aristotelian philosophy, arguing that reason and revelation work together to reveal truth. His magnum opus, the *Summa Theologiae*, remains a foundational text of Catholic theology. Aquinas was profoundly influenced by the Islamic scholar Ibn Rushd (known in the West as Averroes) and by the Jewish philosopher Moshe ben Maimon (aka Maimonides.)

OK, Then, So Who Were Averroes and Maimonides?

Averroes (1126 to 1198) was an Islamic polymath born in Cordoba, Spain, renowned for his monumental commentaries on Aristotle. He served as a chief judge and court physician for the Caliph. He wrote on philosophy, medicine, astronomy, and Islamic law. He famously argued for the compatibility of reason and faith, asserting that “truth cannot contradict truth.” His Latin translations heavily influenced European thinkers, sparking an Aristotelian revival that shaped the Renaissance.

Maimonides (1138–1204) was a Jewish philosopher and physician. Born in Cordoba, Spain, his family fled religious persecution, eventually settling in Cairo, Egypt, where he became the court physician to the famous sultan Saladin. He profoundly shaped Jewish thought through his intellect and writings. His magnum opus, the *Mishneh Torah*, remains the definitive codification of Jewish law. He also authored *The Guide for the Perplexed* which harmonized Aristotelian philosophy with religious faith.
